HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (29/07/2020)

- The country is in Stage 4 of the State of Emergency (29 June 2020 -17 September 2020)
- Walvis Bay, Swakopmund, and Arandis Local Authority Areas in Erongo region will remain in Stage 3 (from 07 July 2020 until 23h59 of 03 August 2020).

- Khomas region has recorded its first fatality today (29/07/2020).
- Today (29/07/2020), 60 recoveries have been recorded; Erongo (58) and Oshana (2).
- To-date, 37 Health Care Workers have tested positive for COVID-19,.
- Cumulatively, 1981 (96.5%) cases are local transmissions while 71 (3.5%) are imported.
- There is evidence of a clustered community transmission in Erongo region (Table 1)
- Up to 1210 confirmed cases in Erongo region are still to be placed in isolation facilities.
- More male cases 1200 (58.5%) were recorded compared to female cases 852 (41.5%).

Twelve (12) of the 14 regions have reported confirmed cases; with Erongo reporting the highest 1870 (91.1%) followed by Khomas 102 (5.0%).






Figure 2: Age and sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, 29 July 2020

- To date, 26290 tests have been conducted by NIP & Path-Care laboratories (including 2538 retests).
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 5159 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 251 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours.
- © Cumulatively, 1458 contacts have completed their 14 days of follow up, while 1219 out of 3406 active contacts were monitored today.
- The most affected ages are within 20 and 49 years 1585 (77.2%).
- Those aged 60 and above constitute 56
 (2.7%) of those affected.




Figure 3: Epi-curve for confirmed COVID-19 cases 29 July 2020

Namibia has recorded 2052 COVID-19 cases since 13 March 2020. Up to 534 (26.0%) of the total cases were recorded during week 29 (Figure 3).

- A high number of cases were recorded in the past three weeks as a result of:
 - -Spread of local transmission in Walvis Bay district
 - -Enhanced Active Case Search and testing, averaging 300 tests daily in the past weeks.
- Call centre continues operation for 24 hours daily. Today, 1319 calls were answered including 25 alerts.

Table 3: Number of people in mandatory quarantine facilities, 29 July 2020

- Since March 2020, 6433
 people have been placed into
 supervised quarantine
 facilities around the country.
- A total of 1587 people are currently in quarantine with 259 new admissions in the past 24 hours.
- Since March 2020, 123 people who were in quarantine have tested positive for COVID-19.

- A total of 399 trucks entered the country through various ground crossing points in the last 24 hours.
- Of these trucks, 44.9% were heading to Khomas, 20.3% to //Kharas while 13.5% were heading to Erongo region.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTION

- National level continues to support the regions
- O Regions have enhanced social mobilization on COVID-19
- Targeted testing in Walvis Bay is ongoing
- Regions have intensified surveillance on travellers from high risk areas for early case detection

CHALLENGES

- Inadequate Human resources in the regions
- Inadequate ICU facilities and ICU equipment in the regions
- Inadequate isolation units, at health facilities in the regions.
- O Inadequate PPE
- Inadequate nasopharyngeal swabs and appropriate transport media.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- The Ministry to fast track the appointment of critical positions for the response in the regions
- Provision of fully equipped ICU facilities in the regions.
- Establish fully equipped isolation units at health facilities in the regions.
- O Logistics pillar to continue with the procurement and distribution of sufficient PPE to the regions to ensure that response is not interrupted.
