## HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (31/07/2020)

- The country is in Stage 4 of the State of Emergency (4 August 2020 -17 September 2020)
- Walvis Bay, Swakopmund, and Arandis Local Authority Areas in Erongo region's Stage 3 is extended (from 04 August 2020 until 23h59 of 31 August 2020).

 ⊕ Today (31/07/2020), 7 recoveries have been recorded; all from Erongo Region.

- To-date, 39 Health Care Workers have tested positive for COVID-19.
- Cumulatively, 2151 (96.7%) cases are local transmissions while 73 (3.3%) are imported.
- There is evidence of a clustered community transmission in Erongo region (Table 1)
- Up to 1280 confirmed cases in Erongo region are still to be placed in isolation facilities.
- More male cases 1293(58.1%) were recorded compared to female cases 931 (41.9%).

Twelve (12) of the 14 regions have reported confirmed cases; with Erongo reporting the highest 1999 (89.9%) followed by Khomas 136 (6.1%).




Figure 1: Distribution of suspected and confirmed COVID-19 cases in Namibia by District, 31 July 2020




Figure 2: Age and sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, 31 July 2020

- To date, 27312 tests have been conducted by NIP & Path-Care laboratories (including 2699 retests).
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 5506 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 76 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours.
- Cumulatively, 1634 contacts have completed their 14 days of follow up, while 631 out of 3555 active contacts were monitored today.
- The most affected ages are within 20 and 49 years 1720 (77.3%).
- Those aged 60 and above constitute 57
   (2.7%) of those affected.




Figure 3: Epi-curve for confirmed COVID-19 cases 31 July 2020

Namibia has recorded 2224 COVID-19 cases since 13 March 2020. Up to 537 (24.1%) of the total cases were recorded during week 31 (Figure 3).

- A high number of cases were recorded in the past three weeks as a result of:
  - -Spread of local transmission in Walvis Bay district
  - -Enhanced Active Case Search and testing, averaging 300 tests daily in the past weeks.
- Call centre continues operation for 24 hours daily. Today, 1248 calls were answered including 31 alerts.

- Since March 2020, 6539
   people have been placed into

- A total of 1662 people are currently in quarantine with 61 new admissions in the past 24 hours.

- A total of 329 trucks entered the country through various ground crossing points in the last 24 hours.
- of these trucks, 35.6% were heading to Khomas, 30.7% to //Kharas while 21.3% were heading to Erongo region.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH ACTION

- National level continues to support the regions
- Regions have enhanced social mobilization on COVID-19
- O Targeted testing in Walvis Bay is ongoing
- O Regions have intensified surveillance on travellers from high risk areas for early case detection

#### CHALLENGES

- Inadequate Human resources in the regions
- Inadequate ICU facilities and ICU equipment at referral hospitals and high care units in the districts.
- Inadequate isolation units, at health facilities in the regions.
- O Inadequate PPE
- Inadequate nasopharyngeal swabs and appropriate transport media.
- Prolonged turn-around time of results at NIP.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- The Ministry to fast track the appointment of critical positions for the response in the regions
- Provision of fully equipped ICU facilities in the regions.
- Establish fully equipped isolation units at health facilities in the regions.
- O Logistics pillar to continue with the procurement and distribution of sufficient PPE to the regions to ensure that response is not interrupted.
- NIP to continue sourcing for swabs and appropriate transport media.
