

HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (18/02/2021)

- A total of 36993 cases have been recorded to-date, representing 1% of the population.
- More male cases 18789 (51%) were recorded compared to female cases 18204 (49%).
- Of the total confirmed cases, 1705 (5%) Health Workers (HWs) have tested positive for COVID-19 to-date.
 - 1315 (77%) State; 382 (22%) Private, 4 (0.2%) Non-Governmental Organizations.
 - 1648 (97%) recoveries and 6 (0.4%) deaths.
- The recovery rate now stands at 94%.



- All fourteen (14) regions have reported confirmed cases; Khomas and Erongo regions reported the highest with 14928 (40%) and 7294 (20%) respectively.
- Of the total fatalities, 315 (80%) are COVID-19 deaths while 79 (20%) are COVID-19 related deaths.




Figure 1: Epi-curve for confirmed COVID-19 cases, As of 18 February 2021




Figure 2: Distribution of cumulative confirmed cases per 100 000 people by region, As of 18 February 2021

- To date, 286548 tests (including 11471 retests) have been conducted by NIP, Path-Care, NAMDEB, UNAM, Namib Poultry and Central Veterinary laboratories.
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 67177 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 378 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours from 9 regions.
- Cumulatively, 62270 contacts have completed their monitoring period, while a total of 8695 (24%) contacts of confirmed cases have tested positive.
- Today, 2143 (47%) out of 4598 active contacts monitored.

- Of the total confirmed cases, 24927 (67%) are in the 20-49 years agebrackets which constitutes the majority of the recorded cases.
- A total of 4990 (13%) of the confirmed cases are among the 5-19 years category.
- The under 5 years age group make 849 (2%) of the total cases whereas, 2355 (6%) are above 60 years of age.




Figure 3: Age and Sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, as of 18 February 2021

- Since March 2020, 34525 people have been placed into mandatory quarantine facilities around the country.
- A total of 2186 people are currently in quarantine, with
 99 new admissions.
