
- A total of 114 400 cases have been recorded to-date, representing 4% of the total population (2 550 226).
- ➤ More female cases 60 384 (53%) have been recorded compared to male cases 54 016 (47%).
- Of the total confirmed cases, 3 884 (3%) are Health Workers.
  - **3** 230 (83%) State; 646 (17%) Private, 8 (0.2%) Non-Governmental Organizations.
  - 3 475 (90%) recoveries and 13 (0.3%) deaths.
- The recovery rate now stands at 79%.
- All fourteen (14) regions have reported confirmed cases; Khomas and Erongo regions reported the highest with 40 219 (35%) and 16 884 (15%) respectively.
- Of the total fatalities, 2 428 (91%) are COVID-19 deaths while 237 (9%) are COVID-19 related deaths. The case fatality rate now stands at 2.3%.

- The highest peak of 12 787 (11%) cases was recorded during week 25' of 2021 (Figure 1).
- ➤ The National Call Center continues operations for 24 hours daily.
- Today (20/07/2021), 527 calls were answered including 10 alerts.

- Since March 2020, 67 140 people have been placed into guarantine around the country.
- A total of 3 943 people are currently in quarantine, with 170 new admissions.

- Of the total confirmed cases, 69 394 (61%) are in the 20-49 years age-brackets which constitutes the majority of the recorded cases.
- A total of 18 356 (16%) of the confirmed cases are among the 5-19 years category.
- The under 5 years age group make up 2 407 (2%) of the total cases whereas, 10 630 (9%) are above 60 years of age.




Figure 2: Age and Sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases 20 July 2021

- The laboratory testing capacity has been enhanced; with a total of thirteen (13) laboratories carrying out the testing of samples: NIP (including Oshakati), Path-Care, UNAM Molecular, Central Veterinary Laboratory, Namib Poultry, NAMDEB, NamPath, Namibia Central Pathology, DiagnoLab, High Care, Alpha Medical Laboratory, Des-Jo Medical Test Centre and ProQuest Diagnostic Laboratory.
- To date, 590 672 tests (including 13 630 re-tests) have been conducted by authorized laboratories.
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 126 645 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 958 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours from 12 regions.
- Cumulatively, 119 714 contacts have completed their monitoring period, while 134 contacts are lost to followup and a total of 21 150 (18%) contacts of confirmed cases have tested positive.
- Today, 3 744 (65%) out of 5 763 active contacts were monitored.

## **PUBLIC HEALTH ACTION (S)**

- The COVID-19 vaccination programme is ongoing throughout the country
- The government and development partners continue to prioritize the continuation of essential health services.

## **CHALLENGES**

- Non-adherence to COVID-19 Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) measures by the general public.
- High infection and fatality rate countrywide.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

- Continue to give awareness on the importance of adhering to COVID-19 IPC measures; with the involvement of the Security Cluster.
- Continue to encourage the public to take the vaccine to reach herd immunity.
